#### 1. Overview Introduction

This Policy covers the defining principles, purpose, characteristics, review and termination of academic research and scholarly Centres and Institutes. The University of Prince Edward Island (The University, UPEI) recognizes the values of such innovative groupings, and encourages collaborative teamwork of Centres and Institutes their formation within at the University context.

#### 2. Introduction

- 1.1. The pursuit and encouragement of excellent impactful scholarship, research and knowledge utilization creation at the University of Prince Edward Island is principally dependent on led by the efforts of its faculty members. On occasion, faculty members, along with staff and students, may group together to address research and scholarly issues of mutual interest. The development of such groupings collaborative teams can serve a number of strategic objectives, including for example by,:
  - creating a critical mass of researchers/scholars, and increasing their potential research impact; enhancing scholarly collaborations;
  - facilitating interdisciplinarity;
  - increasing the visibility of scholarly work and research within the at UPEI University of Prince Edward Island, as well as regionally, nationally and internationally and
  - increasing the University's ability to link research, education and outreach; and so forth.
- 2.1.1.2. These groupings may be located within a Department, Faculty or School, or may eut span across such boundaries and have a University-wide mandate.
- 1.3. The overarching goal of <u>these</u> research and scholarly groupings is to enhance <u>the</u> opportunities for faculty to be successful in their academic and scholarly pursuits <u>while</u> <u>supporting the unit's strategic plan</u>.

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The goal of Faculty-based Centres is to provide targeted support of initiatives that are key to the strategic plan within a Faculty.

The goal of University Centres and Institutes is to provide targeted emphasis on key research strengths of broad institutional interest, aligned with the University's Mission and Strategy.

## 3.2. Purpose

3.1. This Policy covers the defining principles, purpose, review and termination of academic research and scholarly Centres and Institutes of the University. The purpose of this policy is (*Required* – Start Text Here)

## 4.3.Scope

4.1.3.1. This Policy applies to (*Required* – Start Text Here)all those groupings, formed by faculty and staff members and/or students of UPEI, seeking Centre or Institute status as defined below, for the pursuit of University scholarly, research or outreach goals.

## **5.4.** Definitions

#### 5.1.4.1. Centre/Institute

The University reserves the terms "Centre" and "Institute" for those entities that have been approved by the processes outlined in this Policy—except where they have been established as administrative or service units, such as those providing student support services, e.g., Webster Centre, Math Help Centre, Student Health Centre, etc. National or provincial Centres led from elsewhere (outside the University of Prince Edward Island) are not governed by this Policy.

As such, Centres and Institutes are recognized University entities which connect researchers/scholars with multi-sectorial components of a broader community to advance the generation and application of <a href="mailto:new-knowledge">new-knowledge</a>. Consistent with general practice, there is an <a href="mailto:ascending hierarchy-variety">ascending hierarchy-variety</a> of terms from "Faculty-based Centre" to "University Centre" to "Institute" based on size, <a href="mailto:scope,">scope,</a> resources and reputation of the grouping. <a href="mailto:Centres and Institutes are not necessarily permanent as per their specific funding arrangements or mandated functions.

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This Section does not apply to units and departments established solely for the delivery of administration and operational services.

"Research Labs" or "Research Groups" are terms that faculty members may use *ad hoc* to refer to their research grouping. They do not meet the definitions of Centre/Institute under Section 4.1-and thus are out of the scope of this policy.

- 4.2. **"Faculty"** is used to refer to the Faculty (academic unit) while **"faculty"** refers to individual faculty members.
- 4.3. University Members mean staff, faculty members and students who are involved in operational, supervisory or oversight roles in the functioning of University Centres, Institutes and Research Labs.

### 6.5. Responsibilities

- 6.1.5.1. This Policy is authorized jointly by Senate and the Board of Governors.by (*Optional* Start Text Here)
- 5.2. The responsibility to implement and maintain this Policy lies with the Vice-President, Academic & Research (VPAR).
- 6.2.5.3. The responsibility to comply towith this Policy lies with all University Members involved in the operations, supervision or oversight of University Centres, Institutes and Research Labs.

## **7.6.** Policy

## 7.1.6.1. General Defining Principles

7.1.1.6.1.1. The key criterion for the establishment and on-going operation of a Centre or Institute is that it must add value to the University's of Prince Edward Island's research, educational scholarly and/or outreach mission beyond that which would accrue from activities normally organized as individuals within existing University structures (i.e. Departments, Faculties, Schools). A Centre or Institute should not have expectations of permanency. Their existence is linked

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to the specific functions and goals identified at their establishment and/or review. At regular periods of times, a Centre or Institute will be reviewed to assess its performance against prescribed objectives and to explore continuation.

- 7.1.2.6.1.2. The University recognizes two types of Centres/Institutes: Research Centres and Outreach Centres. Hereafter in this document, the term Centre is used collectively to encompass both Centres and Institutes. (academic unit)

  (Note: Here and in the remainder of this document the term Centre is used collectively to encompass both Centres and Institutes).
  - 6.1.2.1. Research Centres, depending on their scope, are established within at the Faculty or a the University level to undertake research/scholarly work. They and recognize an established, or an emerging, innovative area of strategic importance to the Faculty (Dean-for Faculty Research Centres) or University at the University of Prince Edward Island.

    Research Centres are primarily focused on the generation of new knowledge. General oversight of Research Centres falls to the Research Advisory Committee of Senate (for University Centres).

General oversight of Research Centres falls to the Research Advisory Committee (RAC).

6.1.2.2. Outreach Centres are established within the University with a primary focus on advancing knowledge dissemination, utilization and/or transfer in a manner that extends engagement beyond the University's normal activities.

General oversight of Outreaech Centres falls to the Academic Review and Planning and Curriculum Committee of Senate (APCC).

- 7.1.3.6.1.3. It is recognized that the activities of Research and Outreach Centres are not mutually exclusive. As such, Centres will be classified based on their declared, primary focus.
- 7.1.4.6.1.4. Where Research Centres involve external parties, relationships with those parties must be managed through formal contractual agreements between the University and those entities. These agreements shall take into consideration overarching principles in the Research Contract Policy including intellectual propert, publication rights, support of students, dispute resolution, and so forth.

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- The University may also participate in funded national or provincial Ceentres including, for example, Networks of Centres of Excellence, Centres of Excellence for Commercialization and Research, and so forth. Such Ceentres have separate statutory, governance, compliance, and reporting requirements associated with them.; and Tthese provincial/national centres are not covered by this Policy.
- <u>6.1.5.</u> Nonetheless, <u>sWuch centres</u>, when led from the University of Prince Edward Island, <u>these specific Centres</u> will be assigned <u>University of Prince Edward Island UPEI</u> Centre status, and will be monitored by the appropriate Committee of Senate (see 7.1).

National centres led from elsewhere are not governed by this Policy.

6.1.6. Normally, two University of Prince Edward Island UPEI Centres that covering the same focus, resources and/or personnel will not be established/retained and duplicated.

<u>Closely aligned interests should be combined whenever possible.</u> For example, if a <u>University of Prince Edward IslandUPEI</u> Research Centre were to grow grew into a nationally funded <u>Ceentre</u>, the original Centre would be <u>disestablisheddiscontinued</u>, and the national funded <u>Ceentre superceding it</u> would be assigned <u>University of Prince Edward IslandUPEI</u> Centre status.

#### 7.2.6.2. Teaching Activities within Centres

- 7.2.1.6.2.1. Centres cannot of themselves be responsible for undergraduate and/or graduate teaching activities. Any teaching activities must be <a href="https://based-delivered">based-delivered</a>
  through the Faculty/in a School/Faculty and its academic programs as governed by the UPEI Senate.
- 7.2.2.6.2.2. Centres may, through arrangements with <u>Faculties/Schools/Faculties</u>, assist in the coordination and/or delivery of undergraduate and/or graduate teaching programs. Centres may <u>play serve</u> an active role in the promotion, organization and support of teaching activities, <u>particularly extension education</u> activities (e.g., professional continuing education).
- 7.2.3.6.2.3. At the graduate level, research/scholarly training may be undertaken within Centres. However, final academic responsibility resides with the

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University through the Departments, Faculties and Schools directly responsible to it. Students whose programs are located in associated with a Centre must be enrolled in the University through a School and/or Faculty/School.

### 7.3.6.3. Establishment and Recognition of Centres

- <u>6.3.1.</u> The participants in a proposed Research or Outreach Centre may <u>be come</u> from:

  (a) one <u>or more Faculty/School, or (b) from more than one Faculty/School. As such, Centres may seek approval for recognition and operation:</u>
  - (a) within an individual Faculty/School, or
  - (b) at the University level.

In the first case, the Centre will report to the Faculty/School Dean, while in the second case it will normally report to the appropriate Vice-President, Academic and Research (Research & Development for Research Centres; Academic Development for Outreach Centresor their designate).

<u>6.3.2.</u> The lead participants should prepare a Proposal to Establish a Centre for submission to the relevant Dean or the <u>Vice-PresidentVPAR</u>.

The Proposal will normally include:

- 7.3.1.1.6.3.2.1. The name, objectives and proposed activities of the Centre;
- 7.3.1.2.6.3.2.2. The rationale for establishing the Centre;
- 7.3.1.3.6.3.2.3. -A list of current participants and criteria for expanding for membership;
- 7.3.1.4.6.3.2.4. A description of the Ceentres's organizational structure;
- <u>6.3.2.5.</u> A detailed business plan that includes the financial, space and human resource requirements of the Centre, and how those requirements will be financed.

There The plan must also provide be an indication of funding required to support the Centre (both initial start-up costs and costs of on-going operations) and of the internal and external sources of that funding, where applicable.

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Centres are normally expected to be financially self-sustaining.;

- 7.3.1.5.6.3.2.6. Letters of support from Chairs and/or Deans of areas involved in work of the proposed Centre with demonstrated collaboration of faculty members from the originating department or Faculty;
- 7.3.1.6.6.3.2.7. A provision for annual regular reporting, and for strategic and operational review normally every five years; and
- 7.3.1.7.6.3.2.8. A statement recognizing the Centre's obligation to conduct its activities in accordance with University policies.
- 6.3.3. Proposals will be reviewed by the Research Advisory Committee RAC in the case of Research Centres, or by the Academic Review and Planning Committee APCC in the case of Outreach Centres. The applicable Committee shall consider whether the proposal is consistent with the academic mission of the University, and whether the resource requirements and the sources of funding have been appropriately considered.

The Committee may ask for further information. If the proposal is endorsed by the Committee reviewing it, it will be recommended to the Senate and the Board of Governors for approval.

The proposed <u>University-level</u> Centre will be formally established upon receiving the approval of the Board of Governors. <u>Prior to that approval</u>, <u>developing Centres will be designated as "Projects"</u>.

## 7.4.6.4. Management of Centres

- <u>6.4.1.</u> In all their operations, Centres must ensure that the reputation of the University is maintained. Centres must properly and prominently acknowledge their relationship with the University in all correspondence and published material.
  - All Centres must comply with the University's Visual Identity Policy.
- 6.4.2. A The University Centre will have a Director, appointed by the Vice-President,

  Academic and Research based on their expertise and qualifications, and

  approved by the Board of Governors. The Director of a Faculty Centre is

  recommended by the Centre, on the recommendation of athe Faculty Dean who

  will consider the selection committee representing representation of following

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consultation with <u>the relevant</u> stakeholders, and approved by the Dean, normally for a duration of three years (renewable).

<u>Faculty Centres will have a Director and chaired appointed by the Faculty Dean/Vice-President to whom the Centre will report.</u>

- 7.4.1. Centres may wish to establish a management committee responsible, with the Director, for the day to day operations and fiscal affairs of the Centre.
- <u>6.4.3.</u> An <u>Centre</u> advisory committee <u>of the Centre</u> may should be established on the recommendation of the Dean to whom the Faculty-based Centre will report or the /Vice President to whom the Centre will report. <u>VPAR</u> to whom a pan-University Centre reports.

The role of the advisory committee is to assist and guide the Centre and its director <u>Director</u> on matters of strategy <u>and</u>, policy <u>and financial administration</u>. The formation of an advisory committee is highly recommended when there is significant active participation of, or engagement with, external stakeholders.

### 7.5.6.5. Reporting and Periodic Review of Centres

<u>6.5.1.</u> The Director of a Centre shall prepare an annual report outlining the recent activities and personnel. It will include, and including an Iincome and expenditures Expenditures Statement (if applicable) of the past year as well as plans and a budget for the coming year.

The report will be reviewed by the relevant Committee (see Refer to -Section 7.16.1.2).

A brief <u>update</u> on Centres, <u>based on the annual reports</u>, shall be included in the <u>appropriate Committee's VPAR's</u> annual report to Senate.

<u>6.5.2.</u> A <u>Review review</u> of the activities of each Centre shall be periodically conducted, normally at least once every five years. The Dean <u>or Vice President</u> to whom the Centre reports <u>or the VPAR</u> <u>of their designate</u> is responsible for initiating the review.

The review should examine the operation of the Centre, having regard to its mandate, the extent to which it continues to serve the strategic interest of the University, and its fiscal viability.

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The results of the review shall be presented to the relevant Committee (see 7.1). That Committee will forward its recommendation on the Centre's continuance to the Senate and Board of Governors.

#### 7.6.6.6. Termination of Centres

The University reserves the right at any time to terminate the operation of a Centre for demonstrated academic, administrative or financial reasons. Closure of a Centre may also be recommended as a result of the its periodic review.

In either of the above cases, recommendation for termination shall be made by the applicable Dean or the Vice-President VPAR to the relevant Committee (see 7.1).

This Committee shall review the recommendation and forward that recommendation and its own recommendation, including the rationale for such <u>a</u> recommendation, for consideration by the Senate and the Board of Governors.

## <del>7.7.</del>6.7. **Implementation**

- 7.7.1.6.7.1. The <u>University VPAR may shall</u> develop <u>other</u> guidelines, procedures and/or templates to assist in the administration of this Policy, as needed. These procedures shall be publicly available on the UPEI website.
- <u>6.7.2.</u> <u>Upon approval by the Board of Governors, T</u>this Policy <u>will-shall</u> apply to all entities at <u>the University of Prince Edward Island UPEI</u> using the designation, <u>University</u> Centre or Institute, <u>as</u> outlined in this Policy.

Such Any entities not currently in compliance with this Policy will have six months from the date of the Policy's approval by the Board of Governors to come into compliance. Entities not in compliance following that date shall not be permitted to continue using the desinations "Centre" or "Institute", and shall be required to cease all such usage.

7.7.2.6.7.3. Entities presently approved under <u>prior versions of this the 2004</u>
Policy on Research Groups, Centres and Institutes will be governed under this the revised policy upon its approval by the Board of Governors, and will have

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one year to institute any required changes in management, reporting and/or review as required by this Policy.

8.1.7.1. This Policy will be reviewed every five (5) years or earlier as circumstances dictate and the review will be initiated by the VPAR.)
